The holiday season was a busy one with all the snowmobilers arriving to enjoy the early snowfall so this article is a little tardy. Well, better late than never.

Let's take it in two parts: Safety and Courtesy.

1. Safety first (as it should be):

You think you're a hotshot snowmobiler? That there's nothing you don't know about the sport? Located on the web site [Safe Riders](#), take the test at the end of the section called "[The Course](#)" and see. (Betcha don't get 100% correct.) Did you ace it? If so, now you need to follow the recommendations. If you didn't do as well as you thought you would, take [The Course](#) test and try again.

After reading a number of rules listed on various sites, the main ones seem to be:

- ✓ Know your machine
- ✓ Dress appropriately - including helmet
- ✓ Never drive alone.
- ✓ Don't drink and drive

One other point: If you get stuck, don't hurry to get your machine out. It's not an emergency but a heart attack could make it one. Remember you're above 9k feet. [The Course](#) has some great advice on getting your machine out.

2. Courtesy

This starts from the time you arrive on the mountain.

If you're hauling your machine(s) up, please note that the weekend truck and trailer parking has been moved to the North-East corner of the lot. If unloading is an issue, unload in the main parking lot then move truck and trailer to the corner lot.

If you've stored your machines in a "toy-hauler" on the hill, don't shovel your snow behind some else's trailer. (Note: Many of the trailers are not designed to hold a lot of weight so you might need to shovel snow off the roof.)

Once leaving the parking lot but still on Arrowhead property, remember:

1. Stay on groomed filing Roads & marked trails!

To some, the beautiful site of untouched snow on the east side of the Alpine or other open meadows within our AIA subdivision are just so darn tempting. So, here come the ghost trails and guess what, ghost trail makers? You are BREAKING THE LAW... i.e. TRESPASSING on PRIVATE PROPERTY

2. Speed Limit ≤ 20 MPH

We have numerous entities using the filing roads: pedestrians, XC skiers, dog walkers, snowshoers, and Geezer mobiles. The speed limit doesn't change just because it's winter. **So, keep it to 20 mph!!!!**




Many of us are here for the serenity and beauty of the area. So, waking up to the sound of logging trucks and going to bed with the sound of unmuffled snowmobiles takes some of the charm away. Not much we can do about the trucks but please be courteous and don't drive your machines 'round and 'round at night.

Speaking of noise, [CLICK HERE](#) and check out the [Colorado Parks & Wildlife](#) section on the [SNOWMOBILE REGULATIONS INDEX](#)

No snowmobile operated in the state shall emit more than the following levels:

- Manufactured on or after 7/1/1972 and before 7/2/1975.....90db(a)
- Manufactured on or after 7/2/1975.....88db(a)

Colorado also requires state registration displayed on snowmobiles using government land (see above site) and AIA requires a yellow Arrowhead sticker  on **ALL snowmobiles and geezer mobiles residing on AIA property. Contact Patrol to register your machines.**

Enjoy the remainder of the winter and be safe.

As of this writing the trash compactor is still down and it's all due to someone putting florescent light fixtures in the compactor. The fixtures got wedged in the ram and caused the compactor to fail resulting in the waste company having to bring in a dumpster to handle the trash. The really sad part is that when the dumpster was brought in it was noted in an e-mail blast that the **same rules applied to the dumpster as to the compactor**. Yet, someone has placed improper items in the dumpster. Please folks, don't do that. If you have items not allowed in the compactor or dumpster don't put them in. Take them to the local dump instead so we don't have more issues.

If you bring a trailer into the parking lot please note we have moved trailer parking from the main lot near the diesel parking to the northeast corner outside of the main lot. We are trying to relieve some of the pressure on the main lot so we can maybe delay expanding the main parking lot. Just trying to avoid a dues increase.



As with every winter we have the usual culprits who can't seem to stay on the groomed trails. We need everyone to stay on the groomed trails as "Ghost trails" can be very hazardous to people traveling our roads at night or at times of lowered visibility. In addition, a lot of this is encroaching on private property or common ground both of which are violations of our regulations. Remember you can be fined for violating the regulations and you are responsible for the actions of your guests. Not to be a nag but we need to address this issue in our community without getting the Board of Directors involved and causing difficulties in the community.

For those of you who get mail at Arrowhead **we need everyone take a turn at shoveling the area behind the mailboxes**. The USPS nor AIA are responsible for snow removal around the mailboxes. It is the responsibility of the mail recipients. If the mail delivery person has to wade through the snow to get to the back of the boxes the carrier won't deliver the mail. We currently have only a couple of residents who take the time to clear the snow from behind the mailboxes. If you see the snow needs to be removed, please get the shovel from the package shed and remove the snow.

We will be posting a position opening for a part time mechanic so if you are interested and have the qualifications please keep an eye out for the posting so you can apply.

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Arrowhead is in the middle of winter but it is time to start preparing for forest related activities this coming summer.

MCH Packs are used to repel Douglas fir and spruce bark beetles. When those beetles attack trees in large numbers the flow of water and nutrients is stopped to the top of the tree and the trees die. Arrowhead has had a very successful program of owners and the association putting up MCH packs; and as a result, the number of trees dying from bark beetles has been greatly reduced and is dramatically less than surrounding areas. Orders for packs are down from previous years. You can still place a late order before Feb 15th, by contacting Bill Conway by email: arrowheadforestmanager@gmail.com or phone at 541-729-6259.

MCH packs will be distributed starting in mid-May and should be put up by mid-June. Pick up times, dates and location will be posted on the web site. If you cannot put up the packs at that time contact Bill Conway to arrange for a volunteer to put them up with a suggested donation to the Fire Department.

Spruce Bud Worms eat the new growth and sometimes the older needles on all of our conifer trees; Douglas fir, Spruce and Balsam. That problem became more extreme last year with trees dying in some areas. Areas that had a heavy infestation last year can be expected to be the hardest hit again this year. There are two ways to protect the trees. **Liquid Sevin** can be sprayed on small trees or the lower branches of larger trees with an attachment to a garden hose. Ready use spray or concentrate can be found at hardware stores and garden centers. Trees should be sprayed in early to mid-June as the worms appear from their winter cocoons. **ACE Caps** are inserted into the lower part of the tree in a 3/8" hole drilled into the tree and the chemical is distributed through the tree systemically. The directions call for inserting capsules every 4" around the tree but residents have found that a 6" spacing works just as well. This option is more expensive but lasts for 2 years and treats the higher parts of trees that cannot be reached with spray. The best price for ACE Caps is on line at Amazon.

Logging will continue until spring breakup, usually sometime in March. That is the time that the Alpine Road freezes at night and thaws out during the day. Under those conditions long term damage can occur to the road if day time haul continues. You may initially see some restrictions on afternoon haul; later followed by a complete shutdown. Once that occurs, logging is not planned to resume until the Fall of 2020.

Some owners may not be aware that **on-site tree reviews** are available on their property. This **free service** includes assisting owners with tree identification, insect and disease concerns, identification of hazard trees that could fall on structures or parking areas, and a review of recommended fire defensible space and mitigation needs. Contact Bill Conway in the spring to arrange a visit.

Email Notifications

The Arrowhead Fire Protection District is a separate governmental entity (municipality) of the state and county that has a myriad of statutory responsibilities; including the levying of taxes for the purpose of providing fire protection to the residents of a particular area, in this case the Arrowhead Fire District. Therefore, the Arrowhead Fire Protection District is responsible for setting up its own notification data base in order to disseminate vital information to the members within its own fire district.

In an effort to communicate and expedite vital State, County and community fire safety information and critical alerts to the many property owners and residents within our Arrowhead Fire Protection District (AFPD), the AFPD Board of Directors has established an Email Blast Notification System. To ensure that property owners and residents receive these critical alerts and information with possible emergencies and evacuations, it is **HIGHLY RECOMMENDED** that you sign up to the **Arrowhead Fire Protection District EMAIL NOTIFICATION SYSTEM**.

Please take a moment to fill in the appropriate information below, to be notified by the Arrowhead Fire Protection District (AFPD) and Volunteer Fire Department (AVFD), in the event of emergency situations or critical community alerts. This **Notification Blast system** is confidential and only for owners & residents within Arrowhead Fire Protection District.

ARROWHEAD SNOW REPORT WINTER SNOWFALL 2019-2020

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
